A Funny Old Ballpark

Have you ever seen a baseball stadium with a hill in it? In Nashville, Tennessee, there used to be a stadium just like that. It was called Sulphur Dell. It was one of the strangest ballparks in history.

In most ballparks, the right field fence is about 330 feet from home plate. In Sulphur Dell, it was only 262 feet from home plate. That made it easy for players to hit home runs, if they hit the ball to just the right spot. That's pretty strange, but not as strange as the hill in the outfield. It sloped up in front of the right field fence. It was about 22 feet high!

A man named Skip Nipper wrote about Sulphur Dell in a book and calls the stadium "quirky." Quirky is another word for strange. There is a story Skip likes to tell that shows how quirky the stadium was. It is about a player named Phil Weintraub, who had some trouble with the hill in the outfield.

"A hard line drive came his way," says Skip, "and he ran down the hill and reached down to catch the ball and missed it. It went between his legs. He turned around, went up the hill to catch it, and once again it went between his legs. When he finally got it, he threw it over the third baseman's head."

In baseball, when a player makes a mistake, it's called an "error." It's pretty bad if a player makes more than one error in a game. On that play, Phil made three!

A lot of great players played at Sulphur Dell. Even the famous Babe Ruth played there. When he came to play, the whole city was excited. The state senators all left work early so that they could go to the game. They didn't want to miss their chance to see Babe Ruth. Back then, baseball wasn't shown on TV, so people had to be at a game if they wanted to see it. Babe Ruth was in the outfield when he played there. Skip says Babe Ruth "almost broke one of his legs" running on the hill.

The baseball players didn't like the hill, but the people of Nashville loved their stadium. They called it "the Dell." Skip started going to games at the Dell when he was a child. His father and grandfather would take him.

"My dad would take me and my cousin or my brother," he says. "We would sit on the first base side, so we could see that right field hill. And my grandfather would not let us go to the concession stand until the seventh-inning stretch. He wanted us to watch the game."

One of the greatest games ever played at the Dell was in 1916. A pitcher named Tom Rogers was pitching for a team called the Tennessee Volunteers. They called him Shotgun Rogers, because he threw the ball so fast. In that game, he pitched better than he ever had. He did something that almost never happens in baseball: he threw a perfect game. That means that nobody on the other team got a hit for the whole game. Nobody got a walk. Nobody even got to first base!

By 1963, the old stadium wasn't so popular anymore. People stopped playing baseball there, and later the stadium was torn down. It had been around for almost 100 years.

Then a new team came to town. They were the Nashville Sounds, and they built themselves a ballpark called Greer Stadium. A lot of famous players played there, like Don Mattingly and Ryan Braun. Even Michael Jordan played there when he was playing baseball.

In 2015 the Sounds moved to a new ballpark. Its name is First Tennessee Park, and it is right where Sulphur Dell used to be. What does Skip think of the choice to build First Tennessee Park there? He doesn't care.

"I'm a baseball fan," he says. "I'm going to go wherever they play."

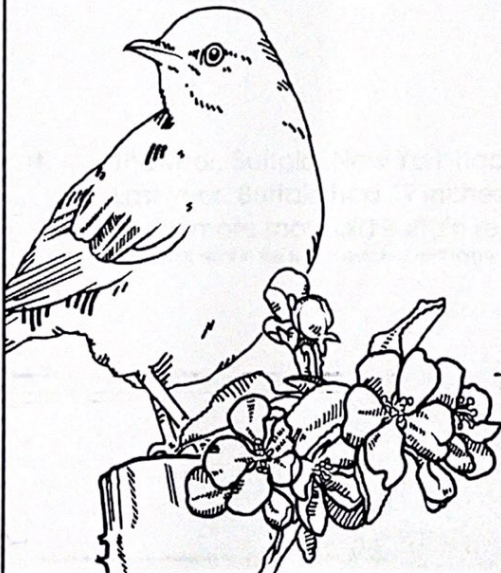
